## Timeline Instructions

DUE DATE: \_\_\_\_\_

You are going to create a slide show timeline (using Google Slides or Prezi Presentations) to illustrate Elie's experience during the holocaust. You will use your chapter notes to complete this task, and you will need to include a picture on each slide that represents the timeline event on that page.

- 1.) Create a title slide that includes: your name, the word *timeline*, the title of the book, and the book author's name.
- 2.) Review your chapter notes and choose the 30 most important points, or events. It is important that you choose important points from all sections of the book. You may combine details from your chapter notes if needed, as long as they remain in chronological order. Once you have chosen your 30 most significant events, then create a slide for each event. You need to have **EXACTLY 30 events** in your timeline, and **they should be in chronological order**.
- 3.) Since Eli does not provide many dates throughout the story, you will **number all of the events** (1-30) on your timeline, instead of putting specific dates. You will include specific dates if they were given in the text.
- 4.) Be sure that you select the most important events from **every section of the book**. You should have more than 30 events recorded in your timeline notes, so you may combine multiple events that go well together when you add them to the timeline. You do not need to include every entry from your notes, so if it was not one of the most important events, and you have more notes than you need, then you can choose to leave it out of your timeline. Each timeline entry will include several details about what was happening, but should not be more than four sentences long.
- 5.) You also need a slide at the very end of the slide show that provides closure to the presentation. There are not specific requirements for this, just make sure there is some sort of closure, and the presentation does not end on the last event of the timeline.
- 6.) For each point of the timeline, you need to find at least one picture or graphic that accurately represents the event on the slide. For example, if the point that you are discussing is how many people died in the train car and bodies were thrown from the train like garbage when the train stopped, then you should search for images (Google is a good place to start) that depict the event (see image below).



Sample citation for this picture  
(assume it's the first picture in your slide show, #1):

Location=the URL: You **need to include the URL** in your citation. Press enter after the URL to create a hyperlink. (A period goes at end of all citations.)

- 7.) You must include the photo source for every picture included in the slide show. You will use the MLA 8 template (**see the back of this page for the MLA template**), and will use proper MLA citation techniques. However, instead of putting your works cited entries in alphabetical order, your teacher is requesting that all works cited entries be numbered to match the order of the slides. To clarify, the first event in the timeline should be numbered with #1, so the picture on that slide will be the first entry in the works cited and will be labeled with a #1.
- 8.) Your completed timeline will be 32 slides, plus your works cited pages at the end of the slide show.  
32 Slides Plus Works Cited:
  - title slide (1 slide)
  - a closure slide (1 slide)
  - one numbered slide per timeline entry (30 slides)
  - works cited slides (as many slides as it takes to cite all of your pictures)
- 9.) Your slide show should look professional, and be free of spelling/grammar/punctuation errors. When displayed on the TV, your font should be easy to read from the back of the classroom. Take your time on the assignment and choose the best pictures you can find. Use a template (or create your own) that works well with the timeline assignment and fits the tone/mood of the points being presented on the slides. For example, a template with a bunch of party balloons would definitely **not** be a good fit for the content of any slide in your presentation.

\*Submitting the timeline: Title your timeline with your name, followed by the word *Timeline*—only include a last initial if someone else in the class has the same first name. Submit to Turnitin.com.
